1. Mr. & Mrs. Bryan Crawford
11 Cedar Avenue
Touring Time 2:00-5:00

This home was built in 1939 by Bryan's grandparents in the grand style of traditional southern "Antebellum". Designed by the firm of Lafaye and Lafaye of Columbia, S.C., it was constructed by local craftsmen.

The home has undergone two major remodelings. The last one was in 2005 which lasted two years. Determined to retain the history of his family home, Bryan resolved to restore the best features of the original peg floors, moldings and silk drapes to their former pristine condition.

A visitor to the home will enjoy seeing the best of past and present, due to its detailed restoration.

2. Mr. & Mrs. Reid McBride
412 Third Street

This beautiful two-story home was built between 1830-1835. The front of the home has a welcoming two-story front porch. The original backyard kitchen is now used as a garage. The sunroom, powder room and laundry room were added in 1996.

All the heart of pine floors on the staircase, sunroom and upstairs have been stripped and refinished.

The wardrobe in the hall belonged to Reid's grandmother, Lucille Reid. Also, the secretary in the formal living room and the china cabinet in the dining room belonged to Grandmother Reid.

3. Mr. & Mrs. Douglas Anderson
301 Third Street

Not many folks will remember that the lot on which this house stands was once a town park and tennis court. Mr. and Mrs. W.G. Anderson, Sr. had the home built in the late 40's. Current owners, Douglas and Mary Anderson, became the home's residents in 1999 following a major kitchen renovation. Of interest may be the kitchen's black walnut ceiling, paneling and cabinets built using wood which came from the J.L. Anderson Farm.

Throughout the house, it is most evident that the couple's two sons, ages 10 and 13, have a strong presence. Collections and hobbies play a considerable part in the décor. Several coastal paintings by Darlington artist Heather Jordan reflect the family's love of the coast, while chicken paintings hint of the children's favorite pets. Throughout the home, you'll find an eclectic mix of art, along with traditional style and a true "lived in" family feel.

4. Mr. & Mrs. Jim Sturgill
221 Hawthorn Lane (Parkside)

Jim and Lynda Sturgill welcome everyone to come by and enjoy refreshments at their home and to enjoy the beautiful antiques which were restored by L&M Antiques.

The mantle in the living room was from Lynda's family home. The dining room table is set with Lenox Holiday China. In the kitchen the antique pie safe and round oak table were from Lynda's maternal grandparents. The antique library case in the den was from Jim's maternal grandparents.

The house is wired with a holiday switch to control lights and trees with one flip of a switch. The house was built with a heated and cooled storage room to store the various holiday decorations Lynda has collected. Among her collections are Oriental plates, eggs, tea sets, and dishes throughout the home and many other family heirlooms on display.

5. Ms. Angie Smith
Simply Southern Bed and Breakfast
504 Kershaw Street
Touring Time 2:00-5:00

Built by the original owner of Cheraw Brick in 1920, approximately 250,000 bricks were used by master craftsmen for this home. Restored in 2004, Simply Southern highlights massively beautiful fireplaces, exquisite moldings, gorgeous hardwood floors, and high ceilings. The wrap-around porch offers a retreat all its own.

Angie's sister, Kathy Sims and her daughter, Megan Watson, along with her friend Alesa Peace, from Charleston, and Kim Morris from Florence are using their gifted talents to decorate this 5,000 sq. ft. house. Angie looks forward to sharing this home with a blend of past and present for its first Christmas as Simply Southern Bed and Breakfast.

6. Old St. David's Church
Church Street
Touring time 2:00-4:00

The building is located on the southwest side of the Pee Dee River on land granted for that purpose by Ely Kershaw, who owned most of the present downtown area of Cheraw. The church was in use by 1772 but was not actually completed until 1774.

Old St. David's Church was the last Anglican or "state" church built in South Carolina under King George III. The church was used by the Americans and the British during the Revolution, and later by both the Confederate and Union armies. There are soldiers from every American War buried in the cemetery. The steeple and vestibule were added in 1826.

As you enjoy the warmth and tradition of Old St. David's, you will be surrounded by beautiful holiday music for your enjoyment during the festive evening.

7. St. David's Episcopal Church
Corner of Market & Huger Streets
Touring time 2:00-4:00

St. David's Episcopal Church was designed by the Rt. Rev. Albert S. Thomas and built in 1916.

The exterior of the church is in the gothic style. However, the interior of the church is more in keeping with the Victorian era of the church design. Upon entering the church, one notices that the interior wooden ceiling with large crossbeams resembles the hull of a boat. This tradition in church construction is to help all who enter to be reminded of the many Biblical stories involving water and God's saving grace.

In addition to the ceiling, one also notices the many beautiful stained glass windows. Some of these windows came from Old St. David's when this building neared completion. Families throughout the years have donated the additional windows. They share the Gospel story from the angel appearing to Mary through Jesus' ascension into Heaven. Please notice the story unfold as you walk through the church.
